


4. FAMILY UNIT

Please note that no one went for a swim on their wedding day (accidentally that is).


8. ETHNOBOTANY AND RARITY

It's actually impossible, by definition, to overvalue what plants mean to human existence. From the base function of energy to the spiritual and medicinal value of rare foliage, plants have allowed us to create the quality of life we've come to depend upon. Sadly, much of our native flora, the signature of place, is fading due to human impact. Here I try to tie together some critical ethnological values with botanical ones. Clovers blooms are created of hundreds of quite inconspicuous little flowers, but upon closer examination they are packed with architectural nuance and geometric wonder. as endangered.




9. SMITTEN BRIDE

This celebrates that moment when you've realized you are standing next to the one you love and know that you've both made a commitment for life. Bliss.




10. STAIR WELL

14. WORKING WOMAN


